# **New Subway Form**

# **Routine School Immunization**

Public Health requires parental consent before providing any immunization to children in schools. Consents signed during one school year may be used until the immunization and/or immunization series is complete, as long as the consent has not been withdrawn. Interruptions in the delivery of routine school immunizations due to the pandemic have made catch-up immunizations in many schools a necessity, therefore Public Health teams may be immunizing students using consents obtained in previous years.

Grade 1 - Immunizations records will be reviewed, and immunizations offered to students who are not up to date according to current recommendations.

Grade 6 - Hepatitis B Vaccine (HBV) and Human Papillomavirus Vaccine (HPV) are offered and recommended for all Grade 6 students. Immunizations records will be reviewed, and immunizations offered to students who are not up to date according to current recommendations.

Grade 9 - A booster dose of diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (dTap) vaccine and one dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine is offered and recommended for all Grade 9 students. Immunizations records will be reviewed, and immunizations offered to students who are not up to date according to current recommendations.

Other Grades - There are many students who have not had their immunization records reviews in the past 3 years and this review will be complete during the 2022-2023 school year. Immunizations for students who require vaccines will be offered throughout the school year to decrease the risk of vaccine preventable diseases.

# My child is sick. Should they stay home?

While there are no longer any pandemic protocols in place, **Wolf Creek Public** Schools will return to following the public health guidelines that were in place for schools prior to the pandemic. This includes recommending that students and staff stay home when they are sick, or become sick while at school, and contacting Alberta Health Services when absences due to illness are higher than usual.



# Send to School

• Have a runny nose or a little cough but no other symptoms.

 Haven't taken any feverreducing medicine for 24 hours, and haven't had a fever during that time.

 Haven't thrown up or had any diarrhea for 24 hours.



## Stay home

 Have a temperature higher than 100.4 degrees even after taking medicine.

- Have a persistent cough.
- Throwing up or have diarrhea.
- Eyes are pink and crusty.
- Has or has been exposed to an illness where isolation from others is recommended.

# It's not just a winter wonderland

When are buses cancelled and schools closed due to Inclement Weather?

In Wolf Creek Public Schools, **Administrative Procedure 132 (AP 132)** guides decisions for school closure, due to inclement weather. The Division takes precautions with respect to the welfare of students and staff coming to or going from school. When road or weather conditions jeopardize the safety of students and staff, schools will be closed and bus runs cancelled.

#### How is the decision made to cancel buses and close schools?

- 1. Air temperature in excess of -40 degrees Celsius regardless of wind conditions. In instances where the air temperature is between -30 degrees C and -40 degrees C, the wind chill factor may be considered if it creates a temperature in excess of -40 degrees C with the wind chill factor included.
- 2. Dangerous road conditions and/or poor visibility (e.g. heavy snowfall, blowing snow, freezing rain, heavy fog).

### When is the decision made to cancel buses and close schools?

The Transportation Manager and Superintendent make the decision after appropriate information is gathered from each of the school areas.

This decision will typically be made prior to 6:00 am but may be made earlier if clear and compelling information is available from Environment Canada or other credible sources.



### Communicating to families & staff

Communications to parents/guardians and staff are sent out **via email, text and phone call** when the decision is made to cancel buses and close schools.

Notices will also be posted on the Division website, on radio stations and on Wolf Creek's Social Media Channels (Facebook & Twitter). **PLEASE ENSURE you are monitoring those social media channels and your email whenever inclement weather is expected, occuring or in the forecast.** 

### Why are schools closed when buses are cancelled?

- Given we are a rural school division we know that when buses don't run it often means the majority of students will not be in school. Staff then are unable to cover any new material with students.
- If buses aren't running and schools are open some families feel compelled to get their children to school. This can at times promote people to take risks that could be avoided.



- WCPS staff still attend their school sites, unless deemed unsafe to do so.
- If schools remained open for students, and road conditions are poor, it can lead to logistical issues when some staff aren't able to be in the building at the usual time in the morning.

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# **Smile You're On Camera** Why is there video surveillance in schools?

In Wolf Creek Public Schools **video cameras provide personal safety and security of students** and personal property. The use of cameras and video surveillance is commonplace in schools across Alberta and indeed Canada. **Administrative Procedure 181 (AP 181)** is used in Wolf Creek Public Schools to govern the use of video surveillance.

- The use of video surveillance is intended to be minimally intrusive, and is used exclusively in common areas in the schools.
- Cameras <u>ARE NOT</u> in classrooms nor are they in any areas, such as washrooms, gym locker rooms, etc. where there would be an expectation of privacy.
- In Wolf Creek, the use of video surveillance complies with provincial and federal laws, and is there to add to, rather than to replace, direct supervision by school staff.



Viewing the videos Anyone who is the subject of the video has the **right to request** access to the video recording.

Parents can request to review a segment of video related to a specific incident involving their child or children. That may be granted only after considering and ensuring the privacy of any other individuals in the video. Access can be denied for privacy reasons.

Monitors will not be located in an area where the video surveillance can be publicly viewed.

Principal, designated employees or agents of the school division only have access to the camera and video recordings. **Videos are kept in a secure storage, are never sold or publicly viewed or distributed.** 

Keeping the video recordings

Videos will be erased or disposed of within 21 days unless they are being kept at the request of the principal, division, employee, parent or student for



documentation related to a specific incident, for law enforcement, or for insurance.

Any video kept will be destroyed once the incident in question is resolved.

### Reviewing Administrative Procedure 181

AP 181 is subject to review by the superintendent.



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### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Starting in preschool and kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10%, or about 2 days each month over the course of a school year, can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just 1 or 2 days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Eventually good attendance will be a skill that will help them succeed in high school and college.

### WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Keep your child healthy and make sure your child has the required shots.
- · Introduce your children to their teachers and classmates before school starts.
- Develop backup plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor or another parent.
- Try to schedule non-Covid-19 related medical appointments and extended trips when school isn't in session.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors and other parents for advice on how to make your child feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- If you are concerned that your child may have Covid-19, call your school for advice.
- If your child must stay home due to illness or quarantine, ask the teacher for resources and ideas to continue learning at home.

## Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students access learning opportunities and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job. Families can also advocate for resources to help students learn if they cannot attend in-person.

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

### WHAT YOU CAN DO

#### Make school attendance a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- · Help your children maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and non-Covid-19 related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your child healthy, and if you are concerned about Covid-19, call your school for advice.
- If your children must stay home because they are sick or in quarantine, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

#### Help your teen stay engaged

- · Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your children are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you child's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- · Encourage your child to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
- Notice and support your children if they are showing signs of anxiety.

#### **Communicate with the school**

- · Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not adding up.
- · Seek help from school staff, other parents or community agencies if you need support.
